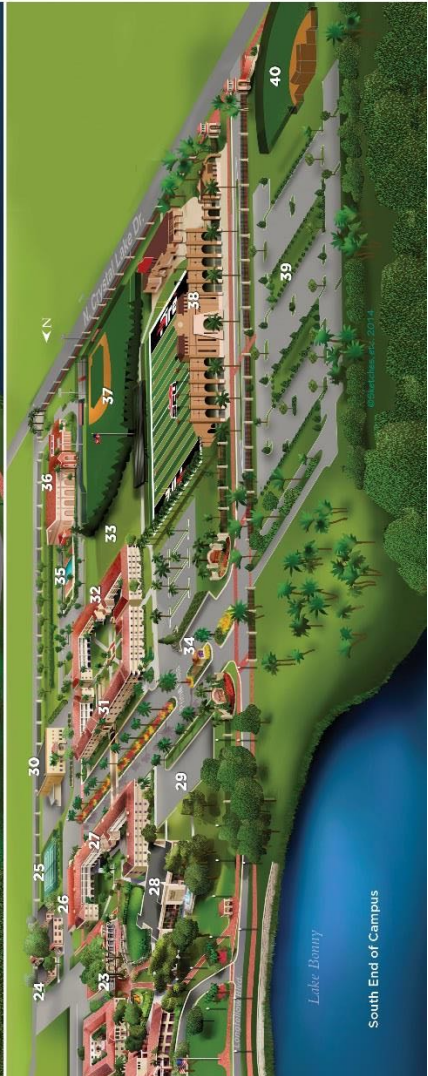
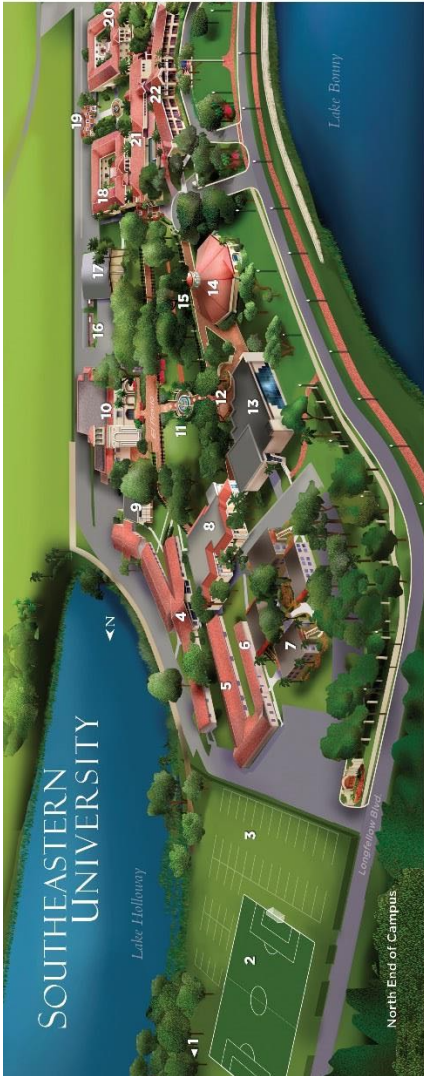

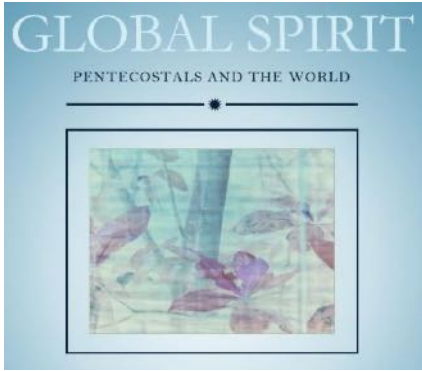

## MEETING OVERVIEW

The theme for this year's meeting is "Global Spirit: Pentecostals and the World."



The meeting will begin with a combined plenary session and worship service on Thursday evening at 7:00 and end with a banquet on Saturday night.

The opening plenary will feature Dr. Ivan Satyavrata, Buntain Theological College, Kolkata, India. The Friday

evening keynote address will feature a paper by Professor Allan Anderson, University of Birmingham.

Along with plenary and Interest Group sessions, the conference includes a Thursday evening reception, working-lunch meetings, a Society business meeting, a women's breakfast, a students' breakfast, and a banquet. During the conference, attendees will have many opportunities to socialize, become acquainted with other SPS participants, and share their scholarly interests and current work. Attendees will also enjoy discounted prices on a variety of books and other products exhibited by vendors and ministries.

Attendees are encouraged to [join SPS](http://sps-usa.org) (see [sps-usa.org](http://sps-usa.org), "membership") before or during the meeting, but membership is not necessary to register for the meeting. Presenters for SPS sessions (other than specially invited guests), however, **are** required to be members of SPS.

### THEME:

## "GLOBAL SPIRIT: PENTECOSTALS AND THE WORLD"

Globalization is now one of the most widely used theories across all disciplines. As a process of social change, it captures a range of ideas including the worldwide spread of economic, political, and cultural patterns. And yet, while these patterns suggest sameness, there is also much difference throughout the world. Often this difference is expressed in social, cultural, and religious forms highlighting competing views of the world. In some cases, conflict characterizes the relationship between Christianity and other religions. In other cases the world is a place in which the Spirit is active and alive where missionaries cross cultural divides to

communicate the good news of the Kingdom. The world is also a place where migrants are transplanted and employ their sense of spirituality to make sense of the world. This conference will explore the relationship between Pentecostalism and the world, the biblical texts used to interpret the world, the theological frameworks to explain the nature of the world, and the social, historical, and political impact of the transformation of world Christianity.

## PLENARY SESSIONS

Plenary sessions will lead off with Dr. Ivan Satyavrata, Buntain Theological College on Thursday evening. Dr. Candy Gunther Brown, Indiana University will be speaking on Friday morning. The keynote address will be made by Professor Allan Anderson, University of Birmingham on Friday evening. Gastón Espinosa and Néstor Medina will discuss the future of Latino/a Pentecostalism in America on Friday afternoon. The presidential address will be given by Dr. Kenneth J. Archer, Professor of Pentecostal Theology and Christian Studies, Southeastern University, on Saturday.

### **Thursday Evening Plenary Speaker: Ivan Satyavrata, Ph.D., Buntain Theological College**



Dr. Ivan Satyavrata spent the early years of his ministry as a pioneer pastor in downtown Bombay (Mumbai), active in street evangelism and outreach in the city slums. He did his early theological training at Southern Asia Bible College, Bangalore, and Union Biblical Seminary, Pune; his Th.M. at Regent College, Vancouver, Canada, and his Ph.D. through the Oxford Centre for Mission Studies, Oxford, U.K. He now leads a multi-lingual

Assemblies of God church, founded by the late Mark Buntain, in Kolkata, India. With over 4500 people, the church is one of the largest in the region with a wide network of social ministries, including a feeding program for over 10,000, free education and nutrition for several thousand children, vocational training programs, clean drinking water for poor families through bio-sand filters, and rescue and rehabilitation of victims of sex trafficking. The church-based ministry of Dr. Satyavrata and his wife, Sheila, has a two-fold focus: *sharing Christ with people of other faiths and engagement with social issues.*

Previous to assuming his current role in 2006, he was President of Southern Asia Bible College in Bangalore, India, during which time he played an active role in evangelical theological education in India as Chairperson of

the Asia Theological Association and the Langham Partnership Regional Council (South Asia). He now serves as Chairperson of the Board of The Center for Global Leadership Development (formerly Southern Asia Bible College). He also chairs the Board of Bombay Teen Challenge, and serves on the Board of World Vision, India. He is the author of *The Holy Spirit: Lord and Life-Giver* and *God Has Not Left Himself without Witness*.

**Friday Morning Plenary Speaker: Candy Gunther Brown, Ph.D.,  
Professor of Religious Studies, Indiana University**



Candy Gunther Brown is Professor of Religious Studies at Indiana University. She received her B.A. (history and literature, *summa cum laude*, 1992), M.A. (history, 1995), and Ph.D. (History of American Civilization / American Studies, 2000) degrees from Harvard University. Professor Brown is the author of three books: *The Healing Gods: Complementary and Alternative Medicine in Christian America* (Oxford University Press, 2013); *Testing Prayer: Science and Healing* (Harvard University Press, 2012); *The Word in the World: Evangelical Writing, Publishing, and Reading in*

*America, 1789-1880* (University of North Carolina Press, 2004); and the editor of a fourth book, *Global Pentecostal and Charismatic Healing* (Oxford University Press, 2011).

**Friday Evening Keynote Address: Allan Anderson, D.Th.,  
Professor of Mission and Pentecostal Studies, University of  
Birmingham, UK**



Allan Anderson is Professor of Mission and Pentecostal Studies and former Head of the School of Philosophy, Theology and Religion at the University of Birmingham, England, where he has taught since 1995 after twenty-three years in ministry in Southern Africa. He has written prolifically on global Pentecostalism and mission studies: nine monographs, three co-edited books, and numerous articles. His latest books are *Spreading Fires* (2007), *To the Ends of the Earth* (2013)

and the second edition of his best-known work, *Introduction to Pentecostalism* (2014).
