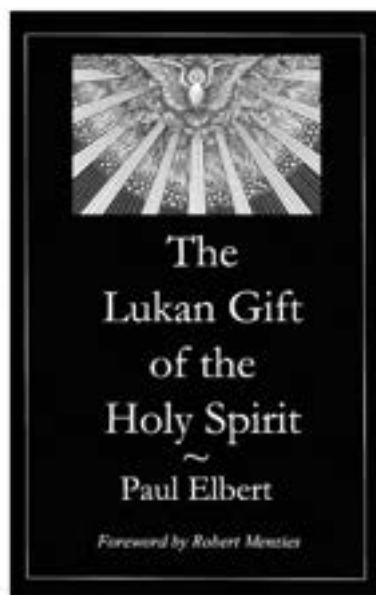

# MEETING OVERVIEW

---

Along with plenary speakers and interest group sessions, the conference includes a Thursday evening reception, working-lunch meetings, a Society business meeting, a women’s caucus breakfast, a student caucus luncheon, and a banquet. During the conference, attendees will have opportunities to socialize, become acquainted with other SPS participants, and share their scholarly interests and current work. Attendees will also enjoy discounted prices on a variety of books and other products exhibited by vendors and ministries.

## THEME

### ***“In our own tongues”*: Amplifying Pentecostalism’s Minoritized Voices**

The 2023 conference theme aims at amplifying Pentecostalism’s minoritized voices by creating space to recover, retell and reflect on their stories, theologies and practices. From day one, the Spirit has been speaking to and moving within the church with global resonances. The unknown hearers of Peter’s inaugural Pentecost address exclaimed: “*we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!*” (Acts 2:9-11). Afterward, it was this same community of anonymous believers who as Spirit-anointed itinerant preachers took the gospel as far west to Rome and east to Parthia. Equipped and empowered by the Holy Spirit they returned to their home cities to share the good news with friends and families and planted the first churches. Sadly, much of their pioneering missionary efforts were left untold/unwritten for the annals of church history, but the legacy of their achievements remained.

Almost two-thousand years later, God’s Spirit continues to speak to the global church, but tragically the minoritized voices of Pentecost continue to be unheard. Recent estimates from *The World Christian Encyclopedia*, 3rd ed. (2020) calculate that of the 644 million Pentecostal/Charismatic Christians around the world an overwhelming majority (554 million or 86%) reside in the majority world (4.5 billion in Asia and Africa, 125 million in Australia and Oceania, 125 million in Europe and North America).

in Asia, 195 million in Latin America, and 230 million in Africa). Conversely, this means that roughly less than 14% of Pentecostal/Charismatic believers live in what many might view as the “academic centers” of global Christianity – North America (68 million) and Europe (21 million). These statistics are further problematized when we consider the racial makeup of US and European Spirit-empowered faith, which continues to flourish more rapidly among ethnic minorities of various social statuses who live within these continents. So, why not reimagine and rethink our Pentecostal/Charismatic faith, theology, and practice from purview of the periphery?

We invite proposals for every interest group that aim to amplify the voices and stories of minoritized Pentecostal and Charismatic scholars, movements, themes. Papers should challenge the SPS academy to consider our global presence as a movement and amplify the voices of marginalized thinkers, as well as their histories and perspectives. Our conference will be dedicated to recovering historical and theological minoritized voices of old and new leaders/scholars/practitioners within our movement. How can US Pentecostal academic institutions and scholars attempt to define, articulate and reenvision our faith and practices without a genuine commitment to a minoritized periphery that has become the movement’s thriving force? Our aim will be to decenter the notion that the US and Europe are the main centers for thinking about the Pentecostal faith and consider the contributions of previously marginalized and minoritized voices who speak prophetically to us from the majority world.

## PLENARY SPEAKERS



### “Reimagining Spirit”

Grace Ji-Sun Kim | Earlham School of Religion

Thursday, March 16th at 7:00 PM

The Spirit presents itself to many as an enigma. Its existence is mysterious and complex, generating misunderstandings and unawareness of its true purpose. The Spirit’s ambiguous nature opens the opportunity for study to unearth the exciting truths that it holds.

The Spirit is present in our world in various forms. The plenary talk will examine the Spirit as experienced in light, wind, breath, and vibration to help us uncover some of its aspects that invite us to work for climate justice, racial justice, and gender justice. The Holy Spirit has always been a mover and shaker of ideas and action. The Spirit’s presence moves, stirs, and changes us to become aware of the social ills in our world.

Grace Ji-Sun Kim is a professor of theology at Earlham School of Religion and a prolific writer and editor. Her most recent books are *Reimagining Spirit*, *Keeping Hope Alive*, and *Intersectional Theology*. An ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), she has an M.Div. from Knox College, University of Toronto, and a Ph.D. in systematic theology from the University of St. Michael's College, University of Toronto.





## “Pentecostal Theology as Imperialism: A Theory of Power and Soulcraft”

This plenary address is primarily concerned with the use of pentecostal knowledges and practices to promote imperialism. By imperialism I mean the religious and doctrinal domination of minority cultures or peripheral regions of the ongoing Pentecostal-Charismatic explosive growth by global centers of Pentecostalism. The presentation analyzes how Pentecostal theology or global centers of Pentecostal influence (example: United States, Nigeria, Brazil, or South Korea), whether consciously or accidentally, foist Western values (or country-specific ethos), neo-capitalist development, and Western social sciences’ preference for “political order” on minority centers of Pentecostalism, and serve imperialist ends. This form of imperialism (national and international) operates as soulcraft. The web of libidinal and affective forces, desiring energy, creativity, intellect, and aesthetic textures of human coexistence in the peripheral (“proletariat”) centers has been disciplined and mobilized, and also transformed into social capital, for the benefit of the core (“bourgeois”) centers of pentecocapitalism, the alliance between late capitalism and Pentecostalism that creates a Pentecostal-capitalist resonance machine.

Nimi Wariboko is Walter G. Muelder Professor of Social Ethics at Boston University. His recent books include *The Transcripts of the Sacred in Nigeria: Beautiful, Monstrous, Ridiculous* (2023) and *The Pentecostal Hypothesis: Christ Talks, They Decide* (2020). Wariboko is also a co-editor of *Pneuma*.

## “Can Pentecostals Decouple Tongues from the Expansionist Mission?”

The phenomenon of tongues in Acts 2 has often been read as an “empowerment for mission” by Pentecostal scholars. Such reading is arguably the result of the ecclesial habit of many white Pentecostal denominations in the United States to send their missionaries all over the world. Drawing on Hannah Arendt’s proposal that European imperialism is rooted in an economic expansionist paradigm, the Pentecostal mission can be understood as an expansionist project with an underlying neoliberal agenda. In this expansionist mission paradigm, American Pentecostals would project themselves into the text of Acts 2 and see the phenomenon of tongues as empowerment (i.e., permission) for them to go to every corner of the earth, speak different languages, and evangelize others. Beyond white Christian nationalism, the Pentecostal global mission can be seen as a white Christian transnational movement. It has unsurprisingly resulted in the mimicking of white American churches in many parts of the world. As Frantz Fanon puts it, “The Church in the colonies is the white people’s Church, the foreigner’s Church. She does not call the native to God’s ways but to the ways of the white man, of the master, of the oppressor.” The challenge for a global Pentecostal movement today is to decouple tongues from this American expansionist paradigm. The phenomenon of tongues in Acts 2 should not be read as empowerment for mission but as the opening of social space for difference. Unlike many Pentecostal missionaries today, the disciples are not located at the center of the global power in the Mediterranean world. They are people on the periphery of the Roman imperial power. The movement in the book of Acts is not like American missionaries who go from the center of global power to the periphery, but an immigrant or refugee movement often caused by violence and social instability in their land to Rome.

Ekaputra Tupamahu is Assistant Professor of New Testament at Portland Seminary and George Fox University. He received his Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University in 2019. He earned a master's degree and an MDiv from Asia Pacific Theological Seminary, and master's degrees from the Claremont School of Theology and Vanderbilt University.

Tupamahu has a broad range of academic interests, including the politics of language, race/ethnic theory, postcolonial studies, immigration studies, critical study of religion, and global Christianity (particularly Pentecostal/Charismatic movement). All these interests inform and influence the way he approaches the texts of the New Testament and the history of early Christian movement(s).

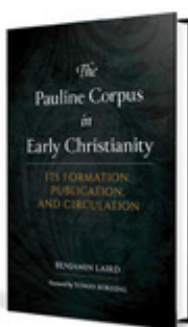

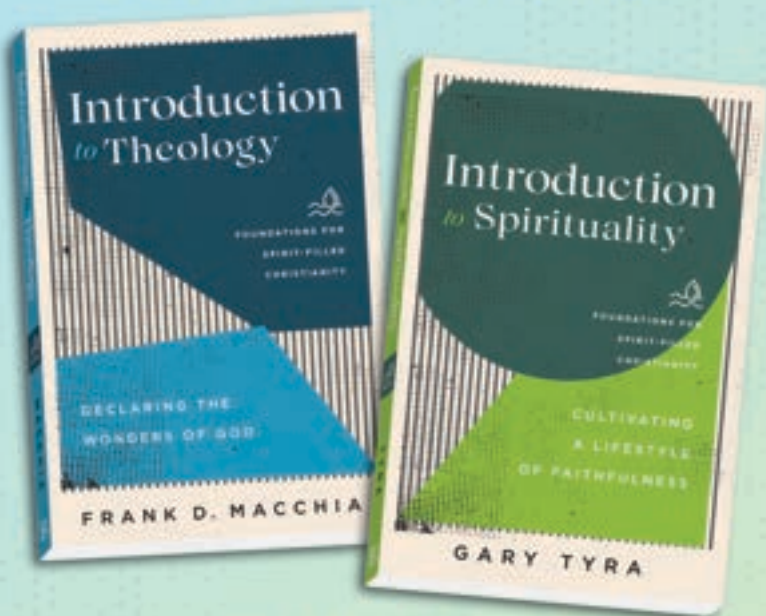

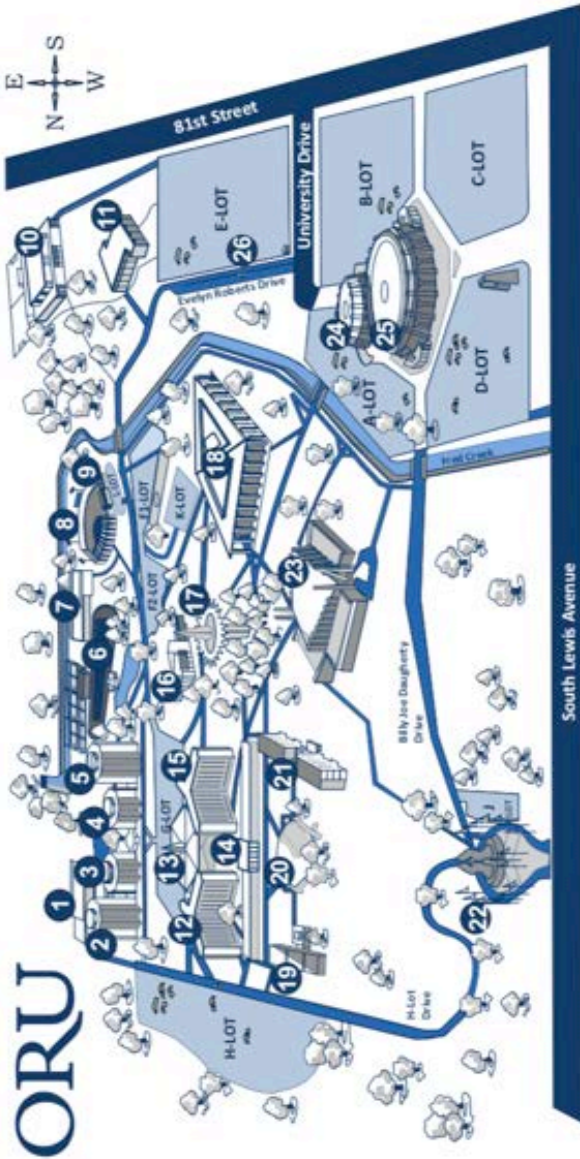
